

Devotional for Each Day of the Week

[The seven verses this week are from Psalm 11.]

Sunday: “To the Chief Musician. A Psalm of David. In the Lord I put my trust; how can you say to my soul, ‘Flee as a bird to your mountain’?”

Praise God for the Psalms which He has given us so we may sing them to Him. **Pray** that God would give you the grace to trust Him in every situation. **Pray** for Dr. Ken Smith, whose wife Floy passed away on Friday; **pray** for the entire Smith family, that they would know Jesus’ peace and comfort.

Monday: “For look! The wicked bend their bow, they make ready their arrow on the string, that they may shoot secretly at the upright in heart.”

Pray that God would protect you from the arrows of the enemy—especially all those things that the devil would throw at you. **Pray** for the Mukonoso Reformed Presbyterian Church in Japan, and give thanks for the Korean family that recently joined the congregation.

Tuesday: “If the foundations are destroyed, What can the righteous do?”

Pray that the foundations of our society would not be destroyed, but would be strengthened. **Pray** that the law of God would be respected rather than mocked. **Pray** for the Kasumigaoka Reformed Presbyterian Church in Japan, and particularly that the unbelieving spouses of church members would be converted to Christ.

Wednesday: “The Lord is in His holy temple, the Lord’s throne is in heaven; His eyes behold, His eyelids test the sons of men.”

Praise God that God knows all things and that He is sovereign. **Give thanks** that Capt. Chris Myers passed another exam as he seeks to become a minister; **pray** that the Myers family would be able to come back to Atlanta.

Thursday: “The Lord tests the righteous, but the wicked and the one who loves violence His soul hates.”

Pray that God would show His judgment against those who refuse to repent of their wicked and violent ways. **Pray** for the Airdrie Reformed Presbyterian Church in Scotland, and especially that the Lord would bless its special efforts this month to lead many people to Him.

Friday: “Upon the wicked He will rain coals; fire and brimstone and a burning wind shall be the portion of their cup.”

Praise God for His righteous judgment. **Praise Him** that He poured out His wrath upon Jesus, so that we don’t have to be punished in hell. **Pray** for the Trinity Christian Community Fellowship as it ministers in Cyprus.

Saturday: “For the Lord is righteous, He loves righteousness; His countenance beholds the upright.”

Praise God for His love to His elect. **Pray** that many folks would come to church tomorrow and would be saved.

“But he answered and said, It is written, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God.”—*Matthew 4:4*.

“Who hath ears to hear, let him hear.”—*Matthew 13:9*.

Q. 1 What is the chief end of man?

A. Man’s chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever.

Q. 2 What rule hath God given to direct us how we may glorify and enjoy him?

A. The word of God, which is contained in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, is the only rule to direct us how to glorify and enjoy him.

Q. 3 What do the Scriptures principally teach?

A. The Scriptures principally teach what man is to believe concerning God, and what duty God requires of man.

I. The Lord

A. Yahweh—“I AM THAT I AM”

B. some of his attributes/characteristics

1. He is a Spirit: John 4:24; Luke 24:39; I Timothy 1:17
2. He is infinite: Psalm 90:2; Psalm 147:5; I Kings 8:27; Genesis 17:1; Romans 11:33
3. He is unchangeable: James 1:17
4. He is merciful: John 3:16; Exodus 34:6-7
5. He is just: Exodus 20:1-17

II. One God

A. monotheism is everywhere taught/assumed in the Bible

1. Ephesians 4:6; I Corinthians 8:4, 6; I Thessalonians 1:9
2. Jeremiah 10:10

B. polytheism is everywhere in the Bible ridiculed

1. Jeremiah 2:28; Psalm 106:28, 36; I Kings 18:20-40
2. I Corinthians 10:20; Galatians 4:8

Observations

A. our God is the one true and living Lord

1. He is a living God
2. He is a consuming fire

B. all other gods are false, and all other religions are false

Application—the information we have about Him should move us therefore to awe, wonder, and worship
